PROF. DR. SOUMEN BERA, LIFE SCIENCE

Myth: Cholesterol is bad for our health

Fact: Bad cholesterol is bad; good cholesterol is a must

For ages, we have been told that consumption of cholesterol-rich food is bad for our health; to be more precise, it invites heart blockage, increases blood pressure, obesity, and so on. Hence, we should stop consuming butter, eggs, fried foods, fast foods, full-fat dairy products, Yogurt, etc. Now let us ponder over the real facts.

Cholesterol is a lipid (wax-like substance), belonging to the steroid-family, which constitutes one of the major biomolecules in our body along with carbohydrates, proteins, and nucleic acids. It is responsible for activities such as the production of steroid hormones (testosterone, estrogens). It helps in digestion by ramping up the synthesis of glucocorticoids, and bile acids also help vitamin D synthesis. Without cholesterol, our cells would not be strong enough to build the structure that we are today, it gives us life support in extreme cold or on hot temperate zones by imparting flexibility to our cellular structures.



Cholesterol has several health benefits. That doesn't mean we should deposit cholesterol in our body from today. Our body is already synthesizing the cholesterol that we need from Day 1. Only about 20-25% of the amount that is entering our system through diet is retained, the liver expels out rest. At this point, we need to know a little bit more about the good and the bad cholesterol. The cholesterol from food sources like egg, cheese, fish, yogurt are entering our system (blood circulation), binding to some proteins known as high-density lipoproteins (HDL), and then carried to the liver, where the excess amount is destined for excretion... and we feel happy. But the cholesterol, along with other triglycerides, from fast foods and fried foods; processed meats and foods, cookies, ice-cream, pastries, etc., are entering our system, binding to the low-density lipoproteins (LDL). These LDLs are the culprits which deny their trip to the liver; instead settle down at different nooks and corners of our blood vessels, acting as the precursor for atherosclerosis (plaque formation), risking heart disease and stroke.

We need to improve the good cholesterol in our body system instead of blindly following the notion that all cholesterols are bad. We need to introduce a little change in our lifestyle and food habits, complemented by a little bit of awareness about the facts. Physical activity along with a well-balanced diet is the key to a healthy life.

Humans ventured into space for the first time on October 4, 1957, when the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (U.S.S.R.) launched Sputnik, the first artificial satellite to orbit the earth. Since then, 24 astronauts have visited the moon. Today space missions look for answers to questions ranging from our very existence to the cure for diseases such as cancer. One such extraordinary mission is the Mars 2020 mission. The Perseverance rover, which formed an integral part of this mission, was launched on July 30, 2020, and it successfully landed in the Jezero Crater on Mars on Feb 18, 2021.

The mission will last one Mars year (about 687 Earth days). Previous NASA missions have discovered evidence that Mars once hosted running water before becoming a frozen desert. Earlier in its history, Mars had warmer environments at the surface that could have supported microbial life. Perseverance rover's primary goal is to seek answers for one of the key questions of astrobiology: "Are there signs of past microbial life on Mars?"

Places that are interesting to scientists can be challenging to land on accurately and safely. Thanks to new technologies, the rover can target its landing site more accurately and avoid landing hazards autonomously. It is more autonomous than most rovers, from the Terrain-Relative Navigation that allows it to land in interesting locations such as the Jezero Crater; to its self-driving nature allowing it to cover more ground in a day's operations with fewer instructions from engineers on Earth.

Jezero Crater is a 45-kilometre-wide basin located in the Martian northern hemisphere. Around 3.5 billion years ago, a river flowing into a body of water deposited sediments in the form of a delta. The Perseverance science team believes this ancient river delta could have collected and preserved organic molecules and other potential signs of microbial life. Perseverance also aims to collect important data about Mars's geology and climate.

For the first time, this mission will be taking us on a round trip to Mars. Perseverance will package promising samples as a proof when it returns to Earth by a future mission. Rather than pulverizing rocks the way Curiosity's drill does, Perseverance's drill will cut intact rock cores that are about the size of a piece of chalk and will place them in sample tubes. It will store them until the rover reaches an appropriate drop-off location on Mars. The rover could also potentially deliver the samples to a lander, which is part of the planned Mars sample return campaign by NASA and ESA (European Space Agency).

Perseverance also carries a technology demonstration called Mars Oxygen In-Situ Resource Utilization Experiment (MOXIE). This instrument will produce oxygen from Mars's carbon dioxide atmosphere, demonstrating how future explorers might produce oxygen for rocket propellants and breathing. Two other instruments that will help engineers design systems for future human explorers to land and survive on Mars are The MEDLI2 (Mars Entry, Descent and Landing Instrumentation 2) and the MEDA (Mars Environmental Dynamics Analyzer). MEDLI2 package is a next-generation version of what flew on the mission that delivered the Curiosity rover, while the MEDA instrument suite provides information about weather, climate, surface ultraviolet radiation and dust.

Apart from the extraordinary technology, my personal favorite part of this mission is that we get to ride along. The Mars 2020 Perseverance mission carries more cameras than any interplanetary mission in history. It has 19 cameras on the rover itself and four on other parts of the spacecraft involved in entry, descent. The raw and processed images captured are available on the mission's <u>website</u>, offering its viewers experience in high-definition on what it's like to land on Mars. The viewers can also hear the landing of the rover as it has a microphone listening to the wind. Another microphone on SuperCam helps scientists understand the property of rocks.

Attached to the belly of the rover, the first Mars helicopter, Ingenuity, is a technology demonstration to test powered flight on another world. Ingenuity will assist the rover in navigating its way across the landscape. The main science experiments will be put off for a few more months, while engineers continue to test its scientific instruments and prepare for the Ingenuity's first flight on Mars. The rover will release Ingenuity when it reaches a suitable helipad location to perform a series of test flights over a 30-Martian-day experimental window beginning sometime in the spring. For the first flight, the helicopter will take off a few feet from the ground, hover in the air for about 20 to 30 seconds, and land. After that, the team will attempt additional experimental flights of incrementally farther distance and greater altitude. After the technology demonstration, Perseverance will continue its scientific mission.

This mission will lay the foundation in terms of knowledge and technology to prepare us for the first manned mission to Mars. Over the past one month, it has studied the planet's geology as much as it can and captured pictures of its surroundings. With this, the team of scientists have determined that several of the rocks are chemically similar to volcanic rocks on Earth, and that wind and water have eroded some of them.

To conclude, I would like to proudly say that I am among the 10.9 million people who signed up to send their names to Mars. If you are one of them, then our names are stenciled on one of three silicon chips embedded on a plate on the rover. The chips share space on the plate with a laser-etched graphic depicting Earth and Mars joined by the star that gives light to both and a Morse code message in the Sun's rays: "Explore as one." With luck, all systems making up the rover, including the SuperCam that provides us with beautiful pictures and audio recordings of mars, will continue to operate outstandingly for the duration of the mission and hopefully much longer than that.
